

BENEATH THE WINDOW
Early Ranch Life in the Big Bend Country

The author calls her elegant little book a memoir. But I call it an American saga to match **Gone With the Wind, Grapes of Wrath**, and even shades of **Little Women** - full of passion, beauty, and pathos. It's truly larger than life and makes everyone cry. But it was the only life she knew. She was born on one of the last American frontiers – southwest Texas in Great Bend which is now a National Park.

Her father, Homer Wilson, from Del Rio, 200 miles east, became a mining engineer. After WWI, he came home to pursue his dream. He saw rich cinnabar deposits in the foothills and mountains on the Texas-Mexico border. In 1929, he gathered 65,000 acres together surrounded on three sides by the Rio Grande River. The next year, he married beautiful Bergine, a city girl excited by his huge vision.

In those early days, a band of outlaws camped along the border on the Wilson ranch. Homer rode his horse up to their camp, the metal shoes sending clanking noises through the canyon. Like Gary Cooper, he said, "You must leave now!" When they laughed and lowered their hands toward their guns, so did he. "If you don't leave, I'll throw you off the ranch." They shrugged, gathered their bedding and supplies, and rode toward Mexico

When Patricia was born, she was the only little girl for 30 miles except the few children of Homer's ranch workers. But she loved this land even as a child. She learned to avoid danger as she ran free, usually barefoot, in this paradise full of wild animals, arroyos, and craggy outcroppings. By age ten, she could ride and shoot like Annie Oakley.

As eldest child, she helped run the ranch. Homer developed herds of valuable Rambouillet sheep and

angora goats, highly prized in the lucrative wool markets. This would support the family and generate revenue to develop the mining operation. A thrill for Patricia at age seven was when Homer let her ride 100 feet down a small shaft sitting in a metal ore bucket suspended on a rope at his Fresno Mine.

Patricia learned to love art, literature, and beauty from her mother who provided plenty of books. As she absorbed the intensity of the land – sounds, smells, and colors, she became an accomplished painter/artist and photographer and an award-winning writer. Since the ranch was 130 miles from schools, she took correspondence courses, then a tutor lived with them for two years.

They had to be self-sufficient well after the rest of America enjoyed modern conveniences. Homer used to say, "If you have a problem, do something about it." When the family attempted something difficult, Patricia's father would say to her, "Now, your mother's a city girl. Take care of your mother." But Bergine was willing to learn. She once joked about the old mail-order house where snakes sometimes slithered in under the back door, "It's hard to clean

3 SITES WRITERS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT

While we all know we need to be involved on social media sites, there are other websites that are beneficial to writers. Check these three out and add them to your list:

- 1. QueryTracker: QueryTracker (QT) is a service that helps writers connect with editors and agents. They have a video about their service on the front page. Over 1,200 agents and 175 publishers have listings on QT. It is a free service. From their Q&A, someone asked a question about why it is free. Here is what they say: "QueryTracker is free because it is our goal to collect as much data as possible about query letter results. To do that, we need as many members as possible to submit their data, and the best way to do that is to make it free."
- 2. National Writers' Union: The National Writers' Union (NWY) describes itself as "The National Writers Union UAW Local 1981 is the only labor union that represents freelance writers." (It is a division of United Auto Workers, hence UAW). They have information about contracts, disputes with publishers and magazines, and scams. They also have a book division. There are too many sections to their website to describe here. The annual membership fee depends on how much money a writer makes in a year. There are options to join for six months or a full year. (Yes, I am a member of NWU and because of budgeting reasons, I join for six months at a time. No, they did not ask me to include information about their organization in this column.)
- 3. Writer Beware: A. C. (Ann) Crispin, Victoria Strauss, and Richard White run WriterBeware. It originated as a service of the Science

Fiction Writers of American and is described as the public face of SFWA. They provide information on scams and unscrupulous publishers that prey on writers. They have a search feature on their site so writers can research a particular agent, editor, publisher, conference, or contest. There is also an area where writers can send them questions about the above if they cannot find it in a search on

Spring Cleaning for Writers

With our May conference just around the corner, how about talking a little spring cleaning?

To stay healthy, we writers must identify any "soiled" behaviors that can infect our careers and make them sick. Some inferior actions hold simple remedies, such as ignoring television and internet surfing, but some are harder. Some take more practice.

One thing for sure is the need to speak up at the conferences—speaking up using our pleasant, professional manners of course—and I do mean good, old-fashioned manners.

Writers who barge up to an agent or editor as he or she is talking with other writers or colleagues are not regarded as assertive, but as RUDE. As my Irishman said recently, "Tooting your own horn doesn't mean blaring inches from another person's face."

Likewise, talking on cellular phones in hallways and in conference banquets is rude...rude, I tell you. This is definitely not a healthy habit for any writer.

So although we must tout our own abilities as well as our own writing and marketing platforms, we should do it when the opportunity arises in a natural way, and in a congenial, conversational approach, using cordial manners.

We shouldn't monopolize Question & Answer sessions, nor should we speak so softly we can't be heard when we choose to ask a question or contribute a point to a workshop. We must embrace our common sense, for goodness sakes.

Lest you think I'm the only curmudgeon out there, here are a few anonymous comments I've received via email from other writers my age who are also a bit appalled at our lapse in healthy behavior regarding pushy promotions:

"Show up for colleagues' book signings and readings. It is not all about you. You are now part of a tradition and a fellowship."

"Do you also send emails and FB messages that

say hello and how are you, not just 'buy my book'?"

"If you are lucky enough to get a review, do you write to say thank you to the person who wrote it and also the editor who published it?"

"Do you write a note (not an email) to the store owner/manager who hosted a book signing for you?"

"Do you send congratulations to a colleague whose name you see with something new in print?"

Hands down, though, both at weekend events, as well as in my own newsletter and other writing blogs, I've noticed how we often lapse into "promotional speak" rather than genuine conversation. Who can


Technopedia defines discoverability like this:

It Wasn't Such a Dark and Stormy Night After All.

"It was a dark and stormy night; the rain fell in torrents — except at occasional intervals, when it was checked by a violent gust of wind which swept up the streets (for it is in London that our scene lies), rattling along the housetops, and fiercely agitating the scanty flame of the lamps that struggled against the darkness "

Edward George Bulwer-Lytton, Paul Clifford, 1830

This, the first sentence of *Paul Clifford*, is often quoted as the epitome of a bad opening sentence for a

novel. It is so bad that the English Department of San Jose State University sponsors an annual "Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest." Entrants are invited "to compose the opening sentence to the worst of all possible novels" - that is, deliberately bad. According to the official rules, the prize for winning the contest is 'a pittance,' or \$250.

Yet, to contemporaries, Bulwer-Lytton was not considered the hack writer, as so often parodied by Snoopy in his never-finished novel that be-

gins "It was a dark and stormy night..." Some reviewers of his day considered him equal to, or even better than, Charles Dickens. Dickens thought so much of Bulwer-Lytton, he sought his advice on the manuscript of *Great Expectations*, eventually taking Bulwer-Lytton's advice and changing the original, unbearably sad ending in which the lovers part forever, to the ending we all know today in which the lovers meet again and vow to never part.

Twenty-one years before Bulwer-Lytton penned his famous "It was a dark and stormy night..." quote, Washington Irving wrote in *The History of New York*: It was a dark and stormy night when the good Antony arrived at the creek (sagely denominated Haerlem River) which separates the island of Manna-hata from the mainland. The wind was high, the elements in an uproar.

Many scholars believe that Bulwer-Lytton was merely satirizing Irving's quote. Now there is the annual Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest in which writers satirize the satire.

BASKET WARS

What is BasketWars? Affiliates and/or individuals create a "basket" (can be any kind of container) with books or items a reader or writer could use (imaginations needed). At the OWFI Conference, the basket is checked in with Vivian Zabel. A silent auction then earns money to help with the conference expenses/scholarships. The results of the silent auction will be posted by the tables where the baskets are displayed. Baskets must be paid for before 12:15 Saturday.

SHEPHERD REQUEST

I am in the process of identifying potential "shepherds" for the 2013 OWFI conference. Shepherds are volunteers who are handcuffed (or linked in some more figurative way) to a speaker, agent, publisher or other VIP who is contributing to the conference.

Please let me know if you would have an interest in serving as a conference shepherd this year.

Shepherding provides an excellent opportunity to network at conferences. In other words, if you need a little help in actually approaching an OWFI speaker or agent, etc.—perhaps because you are worried that the person will look at you and think, "Who is this intrusive little nit?"— shepherding may be just the thing for you. The responsibilities may include:

Picking the speaker up at the airport and providing transportation to the hotel. If the hotel does not have a shuttle service back to the airport, the shepherd may need to provide transportation back to the airport for the departure flight.

- Taking your assigned speaker to lunch
- Making copies
- Verifying room set-up
- Welcoming participants into room
- Introducing your speaker for their presentation
- Assisting with handouts
- Watching the clock during the presentation (not for any particular reason, just because sometimes clocks like to be watched)
- Telling bad jokes during awkward silences (for those concerned about this

one, my son has a copy of The Big Book of Jokes on his Nook and I may be able to negotiate lending privileges).

If you don't have the resources to pick up a speaker at the airport, don't worry: there are local speakers who don't need to be picked up. In fact, they probably don't even need a shepherd, so your job will be easy. In other words, if you want to volunteer as a shepherd but have constraints, just let me know what those constraints are and we may be able to accommodate you.

Keynote Speaker: Patrick Rothfuss



Patrick Rothfuss was born in Madison, Wisconsin to awesome parents who encouraged him to read and create through reading to him, gentle boosts of self-esteem, and deprivation of cable television. During his formative years, he read extensively and wrote terrible short stories and poetry to teach himself what not to do.

Patrick matriculated at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, initially studying chemical engineering, which led to a revelation that chemical engineering is boring. He then spent the next nine years jumping from major to major, taking semesters off, enjoying semesters at part-time, and generally rocking the college student experience before being kindly asked to graduate already. Surprisingly enough, he had enough credits to graduate with an English major, and he did so grudgingly.

Patrick then went to grad school. He'd rather not talk about it.

All this time Patrick was working on "The Book," as he and his friends lovingly titled it. When he returned to Stevens Point he began teaching half-time while trying to sell The Book to publishers. In the process, he disguised a chapter of The Book as a short story and won the Writers of the Future competition in 2002. This put him into contact with all the

right people, and after deciding to split The Book into three installments, DAW agreed to publish it. In April 2007, *The Name of the Wind* was published to great acclaim, winning the Quill Award and making the New York Times Bestseller list.

All this success was wonderful. Patrick eventually had to stop teaching in order to focus on writing, though he screwed that up by having an adorable baby with his adorable girlfriend. He started a charity fundraiser called Worldbuilders and published a not-for-children children's book called *The Adventures of the Princess and Mr. Whiffle* in July of 2010 through Subterranean Press, which was adorable, and seriously isn't for children.

After a great deal of work and a few cleared throats and raised eyebrows from his patient editor, *Wise Man's Fear* came out in March 2011 to even more acclaim, making #1 on the New York Times Bestseller list. Life continues to rock for him, and he's working hard on writing the final installment of the series.

Jodi Thomas is a New York Times and USA To-

day bestselling novelist who has written 35 books and 11 anthologies. She is also a 5 time RITA award winner, the coveted recognition from the Romance Writers of America which earned her a place in their Hall of Fame. With a degree in Family Studies, Thomas is a marriage and family counselor by edu-



cation, a background that enables her to write about family dynamics. Honored in 2002 as a Distinguished Alumni by Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Thomas enjoys interacting with students on the West Texas A & M University campus, where she cur-

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rently serves as Writer-In-Residence. Jodi inspires and encourages writers to have courage and "put feet to your dreams."

Jane Friedman is the web editor for the Virginia Quarterly Review, where she oversees digital content



strategy and online marketing/ promotion. Before joining VQR, Jane was a full-time assistant professor of e-media at the University of Cincinnati and former publisher of *Writer's Digest*. Jane has more than a decade of hands-on experience in using new media and technology to engage and

grow both online and offline communities. Her expertise has been featured by NPR's *Morning Edition*, *Publishers Weekly, GalleyCat, IBPA Independent*, and *PBS*, among many others, and she has consulted with organizations such as the National Endowment for the Arts and the Creative Work Fund in San Francisco. An active blogger for more than a decade, Jane's current blog was named one of the Top 10 Blogs for Writers in 2011-2012. Her presence on Twitter (150,000+ followers) is often cited as a model for those seeking to use social media effectively.

Avon/Harper Collins launched Jordan Dane's



debut suspense novels in a back-to-back publishing event in Spring 2008 after buying the 3-book series in auction. Pursuing publication since 2003, Jordan had received awards in 33 national writing competitions and was an energy sales manager in the oil and gas industry prior to selling. Now she is

following her passion and writes full time. Ripped from the headlines, Jordan's gritty plots weave a tapestry of vivid settings, intrigue, and dark humor. She loves challenging a reader's moral barometer with the borderline ethics of her characters and their flawed personalities—dark, angst-ridden antiheroes pitted against unforgettable villains. Publishers Weekly compared her intense pacing to Lisa Jackson, Lisa Gardner, and Tami Hoag—"romantic suspense that crosses over into plain thriller country with tight plotting and exceptional male characters, both bad guys and good."

Ron Fortier is a graphic novelist primarily

known for his *Green Hornet* and *The Terminator* comic books and his revival of the pulp hero, *Captain Hazzard*. During his comics career, he wrote many series for Now Comics, adapted a Gene Roddenberry's *Lost Universe* for Tekno Comix, and wrote an *Incredible Hulk* Annual. In 2006,



along with artist Rob Davis, he started Airship 27 Productions, a production company devoted to publishing new adventures of classic pulp heroes. In 2011, Twilight Star Studio and Redbud Studio Comics began publishing Ron Fortier's *Tales of the Macabre*, a series of horror short stories written by Fortier and illustrated by comic industry up-and-coming artists. Fortier has also co-written three novels with noted science fiction author Ardath Mayhar.

Rob M. Davis began his career illustrating roleplaying game modules for May-

fair Games (DC Heroes role playing game) and Iron Crown Enterprises (Champions super-heroes role playing game) His first "hit" comics work was on the Adult-



oriented comic book Scimidar from Malibu Comics. Also for Malibu he penciled and inked the historic

fantasy character Merlin and the fill-in work for the new series *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine*.

Rob and Ron Fortier have collaborated on the graphic novel entitled *Daughter of Dracula* and designing and illustrating a number of prose novels for Airship 27.

Mark Coker is the founder of Smashwords, the world's largest distributor of indie ebooks. Smash-



words makes it fast, free and easy for any author or publisher to publish and distribute an ebook. In the last four years, Smashwords has helped over 50,000 indie authors and small presses around the world publish and distribute more than 150,000 ebooks.




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

Homer."

One day Bergine, Patricia, and little Buzzy, walked two miles to visit neighbors. Buzzy toddled behind a parked car and fell. The driver, another local friend, unaware he was there, backed over the side of Buzzy's head and chest as Bergine screamed. The man drove them miles over bumpy roads to get help. "Mother cradled him on her lap; as he whimpered and cried, she patted his broken bones." He lived but had trouble walking and speaking for several years before he eventually recovered.

Also during the 1930s, the Great Depression shook their banks and small network of businesses. many families losing their livelihoods and homes. The Dust Bowl slapped them down again before they could recover, and even threatened their lives. Meanwhile an unthinkable threat loomed: the government made plans to take their land through eminent domain.

Constant pressure took it's toll on Homer and he had a heart attack at age 49. Since they had no phone, Bergine, pregnant with their third child, put the two children and Homer in the car, he on a mattress in the back seat. She drove the 130 miles to Alpine and Homer lived. And just as they arrived in town, her labor pains started and this city girl drove herself to the doctor's office to give birth. A year later, Homer died in his sleep at the ranch, leaving Bergine with 3 children, the youngest in diapers, a 65,000 acre ranch, and a successful mine to manage alone. I'll let you read the story for yourself to find out how it ends. As Clothier wrote, "Beauty and risk coexisted in Big Bend."

After the book was published, in 2004 it won Second Place in the Best Book category of Missouri Writer's Guild and Clothier enjoys constant feedback. An experienced teacher, she's asked to talk about this magnificent historical account of the times packed

with delicious detail. It's sold at Big Bend National Park and throughout Texas. She coordinates presentations when she visits. Recently she learned it's now required reading in the History Department at Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas so she has an enviable problem. She needs a new printing.

In 2006, she won Best Middle Grade book at OWFI for *Sun and Silver*, an adventure about lost treasure in a place like Big Bend and is still working on the series.

Clothier's latest project is a book about the people she loves, called *Code of the West*.

The last time they drove the old road, Bergine stopped at the top of Todd Hill to look back at the Chisos Mountains. "All of us gazed at our homeland. I felt like a lost orphan. Mother turned to us and announced, 'I never want to go back again. It's too sad for me. I want to remember it in my heart." Clothier continues, "And she kept her promise. But I knew I would come back to this paradise of my childhood someday."

Of their service, they say, "Writer Beware's mission is to track, expose, and raise awareness of the prevalence of fraud and other questionable activities in and around the publishing industry. We maintain and continually update the Writer Beware website with the latest information on literary schemes, scams, and pitfalls, and the most current information on what writers can do to protect themselves."

Premise

Christine Nichols

Just how important is premise? In a recent interview, bestselling writer William Bernhardt said "I've seen doors of opportunity close for writers when they pitch a novel. Typically, this is because there is a problem with the writing, or a problem with the premise."

The importance of a strong premise is further highlighted in *Anatomy of a Story*, where John Truby makes the following statement, "Nine out of ten writers will fail at the premise."

A highly simplified definition of the premise is

the "main story idea." However, the premise has many jobs. It identifies a main character, a setting, and the issue at hand. In addition, a good premise should contain original elements that attract readers.

In *Writing the Breakout Novel*, Donald Maass identifies the following additional elements of winning premise as "plausibility, inherent conflict, originality and gut emotional appeal."

With so many factors to juggle in one or two sentences, it's easy to see why premise creation can be a tremendous challenge for new writers.

What can a writer add to make a story idea fresh and unique? Sometimes the original feel of a work might not come from an unusual aspect. An un-

usual mix of otherwise traditional elements or subjects can also create a feel of original work.

Crafting a premise, like everything else, takes practice. Writers may wish to try several things when crafting their novel premise:

Examine the premise of a favorite novel. Read a novel and write out several sentences until a fitting premise has been identified. What makes the premise stand out?

Think through how a story might be pitched *prior* to writing it. Write out the pitch before writing the book. Every successful pitch will have a solid premise at anchor.

Keep the premise in mind while writing. Write out the premise and tape it in a prominent location.

Attend workshops or network with other writers to learn how to craft a bestselling premise.
