## GOD'S LITTLE MIRACLE BOOK

#### GOD'S LITTLE MIRACLE BOOK By Sally Jadlow Published 2010 by Buoy Up (AWOC.com) 87 pages

Sally Jadlow's been writing a long time, but she would never have dreamed where her first few poems would take her. They would become *Sonflower Seeds*, a book she published herself, even doing

the art, layout, and formatting from scratch. But she was stunned and delighted in 2002 when it won OWFI Best Book of Poetry. "A friend said, 'Don't despise small beginnings,'" she smiled.

Late Sooner (AWOC.com, Roots and Branches imprint), her next project, was historical

fiction taken from a handwritten journal her great grandfather kept, entering one sentence per day from 1886 to 1896. He'd moved the family in the land rush from Northwest Missouri to Mulhall, Oklahoma, 400 miles on the train.

Together with publisher, Dan Case (AWOC.com) they burned night oil in 2006 to get it off the press in time for Oklahoma's Centennial celebrations in 2007. Jadlow wore out a whole set of tires

crisscrossing the plains from her home in Kansas City to events in Oklahoma – book signings, city libraries, country fairs, or anyplace with a crowd. In white apron over a crisp brown and blue cotton print dress with bonnet to match, her presentations were permeated with sweet-smelling homemade cookies.

Let's just say Jadlow never missed an opportunity to sell books. "Yet in the whole six years, I sold only 1200 hard copies," she

laughed. The two days Amazon offered it free, it downloaded 9300 times and the two months after that, 189 digital copies were sold. So fast forward to 2010 when Buoy Up Press (AWOC.com imprint) published *God's Little Miracle Book*, a collection of 27 stories com-

posed with digital plans in mind. The week of this book's free download in March 2012, Jadlow scored first place in Amazon's Christian Devotional category, and has remained in the upper tenth since. "My rating was even higher than Max Lucado's for an hour," she said in ecstatic disbelief.

Though she gives such excellent effort to writing, publishing, and marketing books, she has a 'day job' - one that often gives her a front-row seat to miracles. She's been a chaplain for Marketplace Ministries for eighteen years, a Christian organization that contracts chaplains to businesses across the US. Jadlow serves in the Kansas City area, circulating through offices and work stations to counsel employees.

Many stories come from her experiences, including a man who died three times after a horrible car wreck. That was ten years ago and he recently asked her to preach both his parents' funerals - two weeks apart, very complicated. And there are too many other tales to describe here so you'll have to get the book to see why it's red hot.

Jadlow has plenty of miracles left to tell. When her clients find out what she's writing, they call wanting her to include theirs. So this year, *God's Little Miracle Book II* is out, and *No. III* is in process.

We can't wait to see what she'll do next.

# Five Facebook Groups and Pages to Like

Despite rumors that have gone on for several years and all the changes that are being made, it appears Facebook is here to stay, at least for a while. It isn't just mindless fluff. There are some great resources for writers. If you go in and just type "writing" in the search bar, you will get a staggering amount of results. Over time, I have come up with five of the best.

- OWFI on Facebook: I 1 would be remiss if I didn't mention are own Facebook group. There are a few who are not OWFI members in the group because I opened it up to people who are also interested in learning more about us. Members post upcoming events, news, ask questions, share blog posts and quotes, and network. You can go directly to the group, if you've already signed up for Facebook, with this address: https:// www.facebook.com/ groups/91274374466/
- 2. Authors, Agents, and Aspiring Writers: The group page describes it as "a group dedicated to excellence in writing while nurturing a greater sense of community among all members. We invite all writers of all genres to join us and discuss industry trends, share exciting news, organize workshops, and ask the hard questions." This is an active group. They aim to provide a place for

- writers to get together in what can be a rather solitary pursuit. They have some associated sites that are listed on the group page's "About" section. Access them at https:// www.facebook.com/ groups/204725947524/
- 3. Writers & Authors: This page is maintained by Jo Linsdell. She started this page in 2010 as a resource for writers. She offers promotion days where fans of the page can post about their books. She has a linked blog that is updated daily with information and resources that are relevant for writers both in the United States and around the world. (She is based in Italy.) She also shares humor to help lighten the mood when we need a little sanity break before our sanity breaks. Find her page at https:// www.facebook.com/ WritersAndAuthors.
- 4. National Writers Union: This is the Facebook face for the NWU. They share news and updates more frequently than their website can be updated. You can "like" the page without being a union member. Their information says they are a non-profit organization "Representing freelance writers in all genres, formats, and media." Information about membership and eligibility is also found on their page. They are at https://www.facebook.com/NationalWritersUnion.

5. World Literary Café: This page bills itself as "A literary community that bridges the gap between readers and authors, supports bloggers and reviewers, and teaches authors to promote their work." They follow through on what they say. They have additional information on their website at www.worldliterarycafe.com. Their Facebook address is https://www.facebook.com/

This does not even begin to scratch the surface of the writing resources that are available on Facebook. These are general groups. There are a lot of genrespecific groups as well. Be patient and find the one that works for you. However, be careful that you don't get too involved in the groups and pages that you neglect your own promotion efforts or your own writing.

# Learning New Languages

Over the past couple of decades I've attended dozens of OWFI board meetings as a delegate, and conferences as the book

Business is business. We sell words. We sell ourselves. Amy Shojai, a computer savvy and marketing whiz, helped me comprehend "media presence" when I asked her to describe her

"platform," a major buzz word all weekend at the 44<sup>th</sup> OWFI conference. She said she markets her platform of pet expertise, but her

McShane retired from The Oklahoman in 1998, but continued to write book reviews for the paper until 2008. She died in November 2011, at the age of eighty-four.
