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

### The Revision Process: From First Draft to Final Book

A book can change drastically between writing the first, fresh lines to holding the final version in your hands. As both an editor and a writer, Bess Cozby is acquainted with every step of the revision process. In this talk, she'll discuss the basics of revising on your own, with critique partners, an agent and, finally, editor, with a focus on making your book the strongest it can be, and building powerful relationships along the way.

And the best part? This first one is FREE!!!! You don't have to go anywhere. Grab your comfiest jammies, a glass of wine, and a notebook & pencil if that's your jam. You'll log into the Slack app (you'll receive the link to this after you signup on the OWFI website) and get ready to chat.



# **First Person: Writers' Colony Weekend**



I arrived at the Writers' Colony at Dairy Hollow in Eureka Springs, Arkansas on a Thursday afternoon. The sun was bright and high, the air too warm for March. I'd come prepared—I packed comfortable clothes and my laptop. Notebooks and washi tape, a new pack of PaperMate felt tip pens, good snacks and wine.

The makings of a perfect writing retreat.

My traveling friend and I arrived to partake of a weekend at the retreat, both with our writerly goals in mind.



We were shown to our rooms—she and I a part of a group of bloggers and writers invited to come and experience the retreat. In the cottage adjacent to the main house, each of us had a suite to ourselves with a bathroom, bedroom, sitting area—and most importantly, a writing desk. The common areas in the home included a kitchen where we could store our foodstuffs (and enjoy the bounty of those provided or left behind by others), a dining area and a family room tricked out with a large board-room style table.

Thursday evening we enjoyed the Poetluck, a potluck dinner and reading in the main house, featuring local writers who drop in and share their dishes and their words and also featuring us, we writers who were new to the retreat. All through the delicious potluck dinner, I chatted with the visiting writers and fretted in anticipation of the reading. Nobody was more surprised than I when I volunteered to read first. I'd brought a poem and a flash fiction piece and I read them both. I'm not the sort of person who writes poems and reads them out loud, I said. One of the local writers placed a gentle hand on my arm. You are now, she softly rebuked. And I was. After a night of music and wine and laughter and deep conversation around that table in the cottage, I went off to bed ready to start the next day at my writing.

Friday morning brought my friend and I both up early in search of pre-writing coffee and chit chat. We decided to take advantage of the beautiful morning and went for a walk in our pajamas and sleep-mussed hair. Two hours later, after a meandering stroll around Eureka Springs that included an impromptu hike through the woods and getting lost more than once and a significant rise in the temperature, we returned, still in our pajamas and sleep-mussed hair. The locals were forgiving of us.

We made a lunch of cheese and meat and fruit and olives and crackers with our housemates. We cleaned our messes and all tiptoed off to our corners to write.


Well, that was my intention. But the words weren't coming, the story wasn't moving, no matter how I pulled at it. So I called home and organized my things and took a shower and then a nap and by then it was well into the afternoon and I was feeling rather cross with myself but as I gazed out the window across the hollow and breathed in that mountain air and a soft rain fell, I thought about what I needed to do. My brain unclenched. My body sank into the moment. And pretty soon I was writing. Not on that story that I was pushing at like a fresh bruise, but a different story, one I'd started and set aside and rediscovered.

I wrote some great stuff. I also wrote some not great stuff. Did some planning, imagined some backstory, researched Latin words and Old English fonts. I spent time with my characters. After dinner that night, I didn't want to hang out at the table, I wanted to revisit my story. And the next day, the morning walk was shorter, the writing time was longer. I gave myself the luxury of not being on a schedule.

What I learned at the Writers' Colony at Diary Hollow is that it's a vibrant and active group of writers who seek out writers to support and engage. I learned that the







sort of beautiful space I might need to feed my writing is a short drive from my home and is not cost-prohibitive. I learned that some pretty big names had stayed there before me—little old unpublished me.

But more importantly, a weekend at a writer's colony reminded me what I love about writing. Losing myself in a story, connecting with other writers, creation and giving my brain room to play.

## Watching Your Language: Modifiers

### Oh! Dangle Me Not!

Anybody old enough to remember the big flap a few decades ago about "spy dust," the chemical tracking agent the Russians were accused of shaking around in the path of our diplomats and correspondents? An NBC news story on the Today Show told it this way: "Sprayed on a doorknob or steering wheel, a diplomat can become an unknowing carrier . . ." I caught another station, KARK-TV in Little Rock, allowing a jewelry store to spew this one into the air waves: "Forced by the Bank of England to be sold, you can save a whopping . . ."

These ear-bangers are call danglers, or dangling modifiers. In both these examples the danglers happen to be participial phrases, but adjective or adverbs and their phrases are often found dangling as well. The problem here is one of positioning. The trick to remember is to put the noun or pronoun you mean the phrase to modify or describe nearest the modifier. Thus, you'll avoid such nonsense as spraying a diplomat on a doorknob. Or the misfortune of being sold by the Bank of England.

Like Mark Twain, I was very wise at age eighteen. Much wiser certainly than my elders, especially my Arkansas elders, who, I believed, had a monopoly on ignorance in most matters, notably the pronunciation and use of the English language. But unlike Twain, I required many more years, miles, schools, and books before coming to see how much the old folks had learned in my absence.

I learned, for instance, that the South has no monopoly at all on the doubling of "ed," as in the substandard drowned-ed. Or spayed-ed as the past tense of spay. Actually, spade and spay share a common root in the Latin spathe, meaning sword. A Middle French derivative, espeer, meant "to cut with a sword." It's a short step, then, to the meaning of spay: "to remove the ovaries of a female animal." By cutting with a sharp instrument, naturally. The etymology won't rescue you from scorn, however, if you insist on "The vet spayed-ed my cat." Meeorrrrw, no!

Somebody posed this question to me in a note. He said he'd heard the phrase "black humor," which his wife insisted pertained to humor dealing with blacks. He said it didn't seem so to him, and would I clarify? Here goes: the term is often misunderstood and misused, but it has nothing to do with blacks. It seems to be a new form of gallows humor. American Heritage Dictionary defines it this way: "the humor of the morbid and the absurd, especially in its development as a literary genre." Barnhart Dictionary tells us it is "a form of humor in literature based on absurd, grotesque, or morbid situations." Roy Copperud, in his American Usage and Style—the Consensus, cites an example of black humor from "The Godfather": "Make him an offer he can't refuse," that is, an offer whose refusal would have fatal consequences for the refuser.



#### Speakers Mark Alpert



Mark Alpert is an author of internationally bestselling science thrillers and a contributing editor at Scientific American. In his long journalism career, he has specialized in explaining scientific ideas to readers and simplifying esoteric concepts such as extra dimensions and parallel universes. And now, in his novels, Alpert weaves cutting-edge theories and technologies into high-energy thrillers that make the science come to life.

A lifelong science geek, Alpert majored in astrophysics at Princeton University and wrote his undergraduate thesis on the application of Einstein's theory of relativity to Flatland, a hypothetical universe with only two spatial dimensions. (The resulting paper was published in the Journal of General Relativity and Gravitation and has been cited in more than 100 scholarly articles.) After Princeton, Alpert entered the creative writing program at Columbia University, where he earned an M.F.A. in poetry in 1984. He started his journalism career as a small-town reporter for the Claremont (N.H.) Eagle Times, then moved on to the Montgomery (Ala.) Advertiser. In 1987 he became a reporter for Fortune Magazine, and over the next five years he wrote about the computer industry and emerging technologies. During the 1990s, Alpert worked freelance, contributing

articles to Popular Mechanics and writing anchor copy for CNN's Moneyline show. He also began to write fiction, selling his first short story to Playboy in 1991.

In 1998 Alpert joined the board of editors at Scientific American, where he edited feature stories for the magazine and wrote a column on high-tech gadgets. With his love for science reawakened, he wrote his first novel, Final Theory, about Albert Einstein and his historic quest for the Theory of Everything. Published by Touchstone/ Simon & Schuster in 2008, Final Theory was hailed as one of the best thrillers of the year by Booklist and the American Booksellers Association. Foreign rights to the novel were sold in more than twenty languages, Reader's Digest condensed the book, and the movie rights were acquired by Radar Pictures, a Los Angeles filmproduction company.

Alpert continued the saga of the Theory of Everything in his second book, The Omega Theory, a gripping story about religious fanatics who try to trigger Doomsday by altering the laws of quantum physics. His next thriller, Extinction, focused on brain-computer interfaces and a collective intelligence that decides to exterminate the human race. His fourth novel. The Furies. told the story of an ancient clan who share a genetic mutation so shocking that its discovery changes the course of history. His 2016 thriller, The Orion Plan, described an extraterrestrial invasion of New York City. And his young adult trilogy -- The Six (2015), The Siege (2016), and The Silence (to be published in July 2017) -- is about six dving teenagers whose lives are "saved" when their minds are downloaded into U.S. Army robots. The Six earned extravagant praise from Booklist, School Library Journal, and Goosebumps author R.L. Stine and was nominated for the Cybils Awards.

Alpert lives in New York City with his wife and two non-robotic teenagers. He's a proud member of Scientific American's softball team, the Big Bangers.

#### Linda Apple



Linda Apple is a Mississippi gal whose roots run deep in the South. Her stories flow from generations of Southern women who shared their stories and their wisdom while cooking, enjoying meals together, and rocking on the front porch in the velvety, magnolia-perfumed evening breeze. From this rich heritage of storytelling and these memories, Linda's path to writing was formed.
